ICE FORMS ON WETLANDS, PONDS & LAKES

Wetlands lock into shimmering sheets of ice while streams develop side shelves and delicate freeze-patterns.

TREES CREAK AND POP

Cold snaps tighten the bark and wood fibers of trees, creating the mysterious "popping" sounds of winter forests.

SUNLIGHT QUIETLY RETURNS

Days grow noticeably longer by mid-month, and sunsets shift later each night—small but hopeful signs of the turning year.

SPRING NESTS ARE REVEALED

With leaves off the trees, old bird nests become easy to spot. These nests tell the story of last spring's activity and offer clues about which species call the area home.

EXPLORE

Parsons Marsh and **Steadman Pond** offer beautiful winter views. Ice shifts with temperature changes, so no two frozen wetlands look the same from day to day.
